#### A PUBLIC LIBRARY FOR RATOATH - POSSIBLE ?

#### COUNCILLOR CLAIMS PESTER POWER POLITICS WOULD HELP LOCAL REPRESENTATIVES DELIVER BETTER INFRASTRUCTURE FOR RATOATH

Gillian Toole, one of our local public representatives, made an interesting comment recently when dealing with local complaints regarding the lack of certain infrastructure in Ratoath :

'It's a huge pity that more Ratoath people didn't make submissions to the draft county development plan (only 12 made excluding councillors and developers).'

The point was further elaborated that in modern politics, pester power is more effective than merit and the low level of Ratoath submissions (28 in total) was compared with the 736 Ashbourne submissions made to the draft Meath County Development Plan.

Clearly our public representatives feel that their job would be easier if Ratoath residents were to make such submissions and that greater visible public demand for action to State agencies would help our public representatives better deliver new infrastructure to Ratoath.

Over the coming months, we intend to focus each month on at least raising local awareness and knowledge of the facts concerning Ratoath Infrastructure. It is not our role to take sides but rather to inform and if residents feel strongly enough on certain issues then their opportunity will come with the Ratoath Local Area Plan in 2023 when public submissions can be made.

We begin the process this issue with a look at the lack of a Public Library in Ratoath. We were most surprised when researching this piece to discover that Ratoath , now one of 25 towns outside of Dublin with a population of between 7,500 and 14,000 in the 2016 Census, was the only one of the 25 without a Public Library. There are a total of 330 Public Libraries in Ireland, generally a minimum population of 3,000 is recommended before one is developed and yet Ratoath as of 2022 has no Public Library nor even a prospect of one. Instead the residents of Ratoath are expected to use the Ashbourne Library as their local library and so we include a profile of what is undoubtedly an excellent library facility in Ashbourne in this issue.





#### **PUBLIC LIBRARIES IN COUNTY MEATH**

All 12 Public Libraries in Co Meath are operated by Meath County Council Library Service and are located in Ashbourne, Athboy, Duleek, Dunboyne, Dunshaughlin, Kells, Navan, Nobber, Oldcastle, Rathcairn, Slane and Trim. A 13<sup>th</sup> library serving Bettystown / Laytown is about to begin construction and a much larger Trim Library is also under construction and will have a 180 seat theatre as part of its facility. As of 2022 there is no plan to locate a library in Ratoath.

It seems that Ratoath was overlooked through the years for a number of reasons : (1) originally because its population was too small at 1,000 or less (2) then because Ashbourne was a much larger town than Ratoath in the late 1990's and so Ashbourne was chosen as a key location and its current library was opened in 2004 when Ratoath's population was then only just exceeding 3,000 (3) then an unwritten but generally accepted rule in library circles that new libraries would not be built within a 10 mile radius of an existing library which left Ratoath as part of Ashbourne in library terms through the period of Ratoath's very rapid growth from 2004 to 2012 (4) and finally now given Ratoath is not viewed as a high growth town by Meath County Council, it comes well down any pecking order for new costly infrastructure.

The Ashbourne Public Library is a very fine facility with a team of 7 librarians all dedicated to ensuring the library is operated to the highest standards. It has over 10,000 visits per month from library users of whom a reasonable percentage come from Ratoath. Aside from the traditional book library service, Ashbourne Library offers far more to users. Additional and more modern services available include Local History Research and Talks, E-books and Audio-Visual Books, Digital versions of Magazines and Newspapers, free E-Learning courses, Activity groups such as Parent & Toddler, Conversational Languages Meet-ups, Craft Circles, Study Spaces for Students , Book , Film and Music Appreciation Clubs. There really is something for everyone. Recent new initiatives include opportunities for musical instruments to be hired out for up to 6 month periods and use of a 'Magic Table' designed for use by those with dementia, autism or certain learning disabilities. There is free Wi-Fi, self service machines for taking out books and other services and a wide range of recreational and educational events for all ages.

#### **VISION FOR OUR PUBLIC LIBRARIES 2022**



#### **MY OPEN LIBRARY**

My Open Library represents the envisaged library for the future and the plan is to have up to 100 Open Library branches over the next two years.

My Open Library offers extended opening hours to library members on a self-service basis outside normal opening hours, seven days per week, from 8am to 10pm, 365 days a year. Children under 16 must be accompanied by an adult.

A full range of services are available including book borrowing, meeting facilities, study spaces and ICT facilities. Users have access to the library at times that suit them best and the library is strengthened as a focal point for community engagement. Some initial results from libraries who have adopted the My Open Library model are most interesting. In Dungarvan, Co Waterford for example 48% of users accessed the service between 5pm and 8pm and a further 27% on Sundays and Mondays combined, two days when many traditional libraries are either fully closed or open for less than half a day.

#### A PUBLIC LIBRARY FOR RATOATH - COULD IT BE POSSIBLE ?

Clearly Ratoath would benefit enormously from having its own public library and most especially if such a library was to be based on the My Open Library model.

The initial problem is the usual one that is mentioned when any piece of new infrastructure is demanded for Ratoath, that Meath County Council own no land in Ratoath and the purchase of private land is too costly. A Public Library is ideally suited to a town centre location and in many ways the vacant site adjacent to the community centre would be its ideal location. The co-location of a library on that site adjacent to the community centre would be ideal on a number of fronts. The community centre's existing opening hours between 7am and 10.30pm 7 days per week would fit perfectly with the similar hours that the My Open Library model operates. The fact that many of the extra services available under the My Open Library model are capable of being provided by the community centre service working closely with the Library would mean that a smaller library could be built that would fit on the available site without any overall diminution of services. Linking the two buildings together whilst also creating a small green space and linking in with the adjacent Village Centre would create a new true town centre for Ratoath.

Building new public libraries or upgrading existing ones requires major investment but in recent years most local authorities have managed to fund such projects with the support of State agencies. And it is here that Ratoath seems to face as negative a situation as the absence of a site. Firstly Meath County Council would want to be totally supportive. And the problem at present is that MCC have chosen in their new County Development Plan to classify Ratoath as a Self-Sustaining Town whereas Dunboyne, Ashbourne and Dunshaughlin have been classified as Self-Sustaining Growth Towns. And so in the Community Building Strategy section of the County Development Plan dealing with Libraries, there is absolutely no mention of a library for Ratoath whereas Laytown / Bettystown and Kells are earmarked for new libraries, Navan library is to be enhanced, Trim library is being expanded and the feasibility study to locate a new library in Ballivor is to be carried out.

And then even if we overcame these two massive negatives, we are faced with problems in securing additional State funding because of our population size. Easiest would be getting financial support from the Rural Regeneration and Development Fund (RRDF) where many new libraries have received support throughout Ireland. Unfortunately the Rural Regeneration and Development Fund is for towns with a population of under 10,000 and by now Ratoath's population has grown to beyond 10,000. Strictly speaking, Ratoath would then have to seek funding under the Urban Regeneration and Development Fund (URDF) for towns over 10,000. But again whilst the RRDF has been used to fund new libraries in other counties in recent times, in Meath we would need Meath County Council to promote an application for funding under the RRDF or the URDF for a new Ratoath library. The RRDF looks more relevant and suited to a new library project in that it looks to support projects that address building vacancy and dereliction in order to encourage town centre regeneration, projects that deliver business infrastructure within town centres and projects that address infrastructural deficiencies in towns in relation to services, access or other infrastructure that may be needed. But can we qualify for RRDF and would Meath County Council push hard enough for funding for such a project in a town they only regard as self-sustaining when self-sustaining growth towns will simultaneously be looking for support for their projects. Unless there was seen to be a really major public demand from Ratoath residents for a new Ratoath Public Library, one would have to say that the odds are currently not looking good for Ratoath to secure its own library within the next 8 years.

#### BUT, IT IS POSSIBLE, LOOK AT THE EXAMPLE OF THOMASTOWN, CO KILKENNY

In 2021, Minister Heather Humphreys announced **funding under the RRDF of \in 2,562,291 ( yes in excess of \in 2.5million)** for Thomastown in Co Kilkenny to get a new modern library that will act as a social and cultural focal point for the town and provide life long and remote learning opportunities for the local community and will integrate social, economic and recreational amenities in the centre of the town. **The population of Thomastown in 2016 was 2,445, one quarter the size of Ratoath.** 

#### CONCLUSIONS

Clearly Ratoath would benefit enormously from having its own Public Library. Any new library would be in the My Open Library model and given the population profile of Ratoath there is little doubt that usage levels by the local population would exceed the 30% usage target very quickly.

It is surprising also that there has not been a greater public demand for a library facility for Ratoath which in turn may explain why Meath County Council appear to date to have totally ignored Ratoath's need for a library facility.

All we can do is highlight the various issues that are involved in potentially securing such a facility. And it is but one of many infrastructural deficits in Ratoath. In forthcoming issues, we will deal in a similar manner with other infrastructural areas, give readers as much information as possible and let them make their own judgments on what is needed for Ratoath. And hopefully this will enable our residents to better voice their opinions and thereby provide our public representatives with a more visible public demand impetus that will enable these public representatives in turn to deliver improved infrastructure to Ratoath.

#### **Ratoath Plants Orchards In The Community**

Ratoath Community Centre working together in a joint initiative with Ratoath Tidy Towns have planted ten mini-orchards as part of the 'Orchards in the Community' Project under the Host in Ireland 'DCs for Bees' initiative.

Through this, Ratoath has joined the Host in Ireland project to facilitate the planting of more than 1,000 mixed fruit orchards all over Ireland. Orchards play a key role in protecting bees. This is the first time anything like this has been undertaken in Ireland and Ratoath Community Centre and Ratoath Tidy Towns are delighted to take an active part. This initiative gives us the opportunity locally to not only make an individual difference but the tools to educate, advocate, create awareness, and take action. The local project leaders are uniting to make a difference by delivering on actions to make Ratoath more pollinator friendly and ensure the survival of our pollinators for future generations. The project is delivered in collaboration with the Irish National Biodiversity Centre.

The ten local mini-orchards, each comprising three varied apple-trees, one plum-tree, and one pear-tree, have been planted at the Ratoath Community Sports Campus.

Other Community Centre/Tidy Towns landscaping work to facilitate the planting of perennial planting and wild-flower meadows is currently underway at the Sports Campus.
